“The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them” Isaiah 11:6

When I think about March, I can't help but remember the old phrase that, “March comes in like a lion, and goes out like a lamb.” This gets me thinking about lions and lambs and, of course, the above scripture passage immediately came to mind. Animal imagery is often used in the Bible to try and explain to people what the kingdom of God is like. It is even used to describe Jesus himself. He is described as both the Lion of Judah, and the Lamb of God. How can he be both? I think it speaks to the nature of God being greater than anything that we can understand. God is both strong and powerful as a lion. A lion is the king of the jungle, and God is our eternal king. A lamb represents the sacrifice that the ancient Israelites gave to God, and Jesus is the ultimate sacrifice that takes away all of our sin and gives us eternal life. Too often we get hung up on one or two images of what God is like and we forget the hundreds of ways that God is described in the Bible: mothering hen, rock, wind, light, father, brother, friend, and so many others. We all have our favorites, but we need to remember that not one image of God is complete, and even if we looked at all of the images that are used in the Bible, we still wouldn't have a complete picture.

March is a wonderfully unpredictable month that can have warm, sunny days and cold, snowy ones. To describe March as just the end of winter or the beginning of Spring would be to miss so much more that happens. So, also, to understand God, we have to be open to all of the ways in which God can be seen in the world. Not all of these images may be meaningful for you. Some may even be challenging or problematic. But they all speak to aspects of God that one day we will understand; when we see the lion and the lamb, together, in one being. Until that day, be on the lookout for lions, lambs and all the rest.

## FROM THE BENCH...

As I write this, weeks before you will read it, I am reflecting on a sermon of Vicar Chris's in which he challenged us all to change, in ways both large and obvious as well as subtle and discreet. Change is an issue I am sure you are all dealing with at St. Paul's III, as growth requires change and adaptation.

Vicar Chris started at St. Paul's in the fall, and a month later I came on board. You have been dealing with new faces, new voices, changes in liturgy, order of worship, style, and music. And, as far as I can tell, you have done so graciously and with respect and appreciation for the difficulty we newcomers face. I speak only for myself, but I appreciate greatly the patience and the openness you have shown as we tread that line between honoring past traditions and instituting changes to bring new vitality to the worship experience and growth to the congregation both in numbers and in spirit.

I offer my own suggestions for the changes Vicar Chris suggested we explore for our spiritual lives. First, how about changing your pew for a seat in the choir loft? I know that singing in the choir or performing instrumental music doesn't have the importance of ministering to the community or visiting the sick and shut-in. It really is just the “icing on the cake.” But we never know who will be touched by the words of a hymn or anthem, or moved or comforted by the meditation of music. And the experience itself is a time for community and fellowship.

So, if the vicar's message has caused you to think about the little changes you can make to both enhance your worship and give back to the church, please include the music program in your considerations. Bring a spouse or friend to some choir rehearsals, or pick up that neglected instrument and lend your talents. You may find the move out of your comfort zone is just what God had in mind for you.
